Animal Control



Welcome spring! With spring and warmer weather in the air, Willington Animal Control would like to remind our dog owners of some very important things:

We would like to remind dog owners that all dogs over 6 months of age residing in Connecticut must have a current license attached to his/her collar. These licenses are the fastest way to reunite your pet if he/she becomes lost.

If you currently own a dog over 6 months of age which is not currently licensed, you may stop by the Town Clerk's Office to purchase a new tag. Fees are \$8.00 for Spayed/Neutered dogs or \$19.00 for dogs not Spayed/ Neutered. Licenses are available in the Town Clerk's Office located in Town Office Building during regular business hours. Hours are Monday 12:30 to 7:30, and Tuesday through Friday 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Or mail a copy of your dog's current Rabies Certificate, proof of Spay/Neuter (if applicable), a self-addressed stamped envelope and the appropriate fee and your check payable to "Town of Willington", to the Town Clerk's Office, 40 Old Farms Rd, Willington 06279—Attn: Dog Licenses. Please include a \$1.00 per month fine for each month you are overdue. For example if you are licensing a neutered dog in September then your fee would be \$8.00 and your fine would be \$3.00 totaling \$11.00.

Also, with the warmer weather we welcome dog owners to enjoy our town parks and trails, however dogs MUST be leashed at all times. Our parks and trail systems are for all residents to enjoy. Please be courteous, because we are all sharing the same paths!

Willington Animal Control in conjunction with Fenton River Veterinary Hospital, will be hosting a low cost Rabies clinic at the Willington Town Office Building, (40 Old Farms Rd) on June 8th from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. The Town Clerk will also be in her office to accept 2019/2020 dog licenses.

Are you a Livestock owner who would like to assist Willington Animal Control during a large animal emergency? Assistance needed could be anything from manpower, to housing, trailering, or just food donation. If you are interested, please e-mail us at <u>Animalcontrol@willingtonct.org.</u>

The Assessor's Office administers exemption programs which benefit the elderly, disabled, blind, and veterans.

Elderly/Totally Disabled Tax Relief Program: Completed applications are due bi-annually by May 15. Anyone applying after April 15 must apply in person. We will be happy to assist you in filing your application. Please call in advance for an appointment so we may provide the time and attention necessary 860-487-3122.

To be eligible for such a tax credit:

- You or your spouse must be at least 65 years of age as of Dec 31, 2018 or over 18 and permanently and totally disabled per Social Security.
- You must be a permanent resident of the State of Connecticut. You must own the property or hold a tenancy for life or for a term of years, which makes the applicable liable for payment of taxes (CGS Sec. 12-48) as of October 1, 2018. The property must be the applicant's primary residence (domicile).
- Your 2018 income cannot exceed \$36000(single) or \$43900(married) Income definition: Qualifying income is defined as adjusted gross income for IRS purposes plus any other income not included in such adjusted gross income.
- You must provide the Assessor with a copy of your SSA 1099 for 2018, or its equivalent, from Social Security and your 2018 federal income tax return if you file one. The Assessor may require any other proof of income that may be necessary for the certification of the claim, such as interest/dividend statements and pension statements.

Disabled: Any individual who receives a disability pension from the Social Security Administration and has been designated by the SSA is eligible for a \$1000 exemption off your assessment. To qualify you must file proof of 100% disability from Social Security (form TPQY) or a copy of your "Award Letter" that states disability. This application only needs to be filed once.

Filing Deadline: October 1

Blind: Any individual that presents a Certification of Legal Blindness from the Board of Education and Services for the Blind, BESB, that states he/she is considered to be legally blind may be eligible for a \$3,000 exemption off your assessment.

Filing Deadline: October 1

Veterans: If you are a veteran of any war period so declared in the Connecticut General Statutes, you may be entitled to an exemption. An original or certified copy of his/her honorable discharge (DD-214) must be filed in the Willington Land Records prior to October 1.

Filing Deadline: September 30

Additional Veteran's Exemption: Veterans who maintain a disability rating from the VA of at least 10% are entitled to an increased exemption. Depending on the disability rating and income level.

As a part of our vision to become one of Southern New England's premiere cultural destinations, here at EC-CHAP we have created the "*Dye & Bleach House Community Gallery*". This new effort will occupy the main corridors of The Mill Works and fill it with one of our strongest passions, ART! As this winter treks on, we have been able to use this season to prepare the space as well as build relationships with local artists.

We are currently in the process of updating the space with fresh paint and installation of our new Walker Display System. We can officially say that the space will be ready this March and our first display of art will be in full swing by the time we have our next open house event, "*First Sunday at The Mill Works*" on April 7th from 2:00pm to 5:00pm. We are looking forward to welcoming you in as we spring into this new project!

As the Community Gallery grows, we hope to also grow our list of contacts and create a schedule for future exhibits. The Community Gallery model will function with a regular weekly schedule of open hours, manned by displaying artists and volunteers. This collaborative approach will allow us to create a cost-free "platform" for art presentation where local and regional artists may assist with installation design, display their works, and share in the supervision and monitoring of the gallery.

We hope that this space will help to bring awareness to the talent within our community - but we also hope it inspires others to be creative. Our first exhibit will host a mixture of media from a handful of local artists including sculptures made from found metal objects as well as some more traditional landscape and contemporary images. "Raising Historical Awareness" By EC-CHAP

Did you know that there are over 200 organizations identified as "Historical Societies" registered with the Connecticut Secretary of the State's Office? And did you know that of these, there are over 10 Historical Organizations serving the entire state of Connecticut? And did you further know, that there are over 25 local Historical Societies situated within a 25 mile radius of EC-CHAP in Willington, Connecticut? Local Historical Societies, Museums, Universities, and Historians provide a rich knowledge of area history – possessing important writings, oral histories, original photographs, artifacts, research, and other resources that describe the evolution of the area they serve. This collection of unique assets and knowledge assists in answering critical questions, and provides a roadmap of sorts to help explain the challenges, hardship, innovation, rewards, and growth that leads to who and what we are today.

Imagine if these organizations and individuals are able to come together to share this knowledge in coordinated public forums. If each organization is given a platform to communicate and describe the historical significance of their piece of the world, what new knowledge and connections could be made? We believe a shared model of collaboration and equity that promotes discourse and engages collective knowledge will result in a heightened awareness and importance of history, and the need to continue to preserve the valuable resources that tell our story.

As a part of addressing this broader historical view, EC-CHAP intends to begin dialog with local, regional and statewide historical organizations and individuals to facilitate opportunities for conversation, collaboration, and programming. There appear to be pockets of rich history just waiting for connections to be made. As your regional cultural organization, we hope to play a small part in bringing together the many folks who can share knowledge, common interests, and help to connect the historical "dots" that will yield better understandings.

The Eastern Connecticut Center for History, Art, and Performance (EC-CHAP) has been very fortunate to be one of twelve recipients of the 2019 "*Good To Great*" grant administered by the Connecticut DECD, State Office of Historic Preservation. We plan to discuss how this grant has allowed us to develop a facility preservation and adaptive reuse plan at our Spring "*First Sunday at The Mill Works*" scheduled for Sunday, April 7th.

In addition to announcing this preservation effort, we are scheduling a breakout session on April 7th to introduce a proposed framework to engage regional historical organizations and interested individuals in conversation and collaboration. EC-CHAP believes in *synergistic mathematics* where 1+1=3 (where the whole is greater than the sum of its parts).

If you are interested in exploring a proposed model for collaboration, and helping to be a part of this synergistic effort to raise historical awareness and preserve the past, please join us on April 7th at The Mill Works,156 River Road, Willington, CT from 2:00pm to 5:00pm.

Julia Cartabiano, Willow Valley Farm, joined us in January for a discussion of **spring seed starting with success**. Julia's presentation helped us remember the joy of spring

gardening! Julia's presentation was a wonderful follow-up to our "Seed Gathering" workshop with Ann Cilfone last fall. Many of us gathered lots of seeds such as marigolds, zinnias, hollyhocks, nasturtium and Blackberry lily among others. As we have sat patiently wondering what to do with all these glorious seeds, along comes Julia to guide us! She introduced us to cow pots, various seed starting medium, worm castings, and the varied temperatures need for germination! Words of caution...don't start your seeds too early, provide warmth and plenty of light for successful germination and happy seedlings! Julia's wealth of information and warm presentation style made for an informative but causal meeting. One of the joys of a garden club is the sharing of plants, perennials, annuals, and house plants. When my Queen's Tears (Billbergia nutans) was in bloom in January, I was able to share the offshoots with members. In addition,

there were enough offshoots to share with avid gardeners in the Town Offices! It's an epiphyte from Brazil, Billbergia nutans is ideal for partially shady locations around the home or garden.

Garden Club Continued...

The tough leaves have toothed edges, and flowers are borne on long stems. The striking pink bracts have blue and green blossoms and long yellow stamens. It usually blooms during March and April in our greenhouses, and the flowers last 6-8 weeks. Also called "Friendship Plant" because it produces many offshoots, or young plants, to give to friends. Water frequently in the growing season. From Logee's Tropical Plants. If you have too many house plants, please consider sharing them with your friends in the garden club.



Friendship is a major aspect of the garden club which we celebrate as often as we can! Our potluck dinners are delightful. Dinners are held in the more intimate setting of

someone's home. Members bring luscious dishes such as chicken with almonds, pierogi, spinach salads, and homemade breads and, of course, yummy desserts. We hope you will join us one day and learn more about the good work of the garden club.

There's a lot ahead for the spring. Construction at the town offices front entrance is almost complete. We will need new topsoil and mulch for the spring and some more cleanup and planting will be necessary. Select Seeds contributed a lot of plant material and we will be seeking donations from them again this year. It was much appreciated! We would also like to tackle the concrete eyesore on the side of the building this year. Julia said she would take a look and give us an idea of what to do with it, since the rest of us are stumped. Statues, Boulders, and Monoliths: The World War One Memorials of Connecticut.

Presented by Richard Franklin Donohue, President of the Cromwell Historical Society.

Save the date of Wednesday, April 17, at 7 PM for this upcoming program. The program will be held at the Willington Town Office Building, located at 40 Old Farms Road, in the upper level Community Room.

As the First World War ended, American communities hurried to memorialize the great efforts of their sons and daughters. Changes in culture and civic ideas since the American Civil War led to extensive public discourse about what memorials should and should not be. Government leaders, artists, historians, and the monument industry itself promoted ideas from simple tablets to monoliths rivaling those of Egypt and Rome. Memorials throughout Connecticut exemplify this entire range of monumental styles.

Having visited and cataloged more than 200 monuments through the 169 towns in Connecticut. Richard Franklin Donohue will display images of the monuments and share stories of their design, placement, and the people memorialized on them. Special attention is given to the people and memorials of the hosting town and vicinity.

Additionally, the Willington Historical Society will display a number of photos, of the May 30, 1921 dedication of our World War One Monument, located at the top of the Willington Town Green.

Land Use

You may have seen some new faces if you've come by the Land Use Department over the past year. We are happy to report we have made some changes as well! In November of 2018 we worked in collaboration with the Assessor and Tax Collector to launch an online permitting program that allows residents and contractors to apply for permits anywhere, anytime. We have been working with the system over the past few months to make the application process as seamless as possible with the creation of project templates. These templates ask a series of yes/no questions to determine which permits you need for your project. Should you encounter any issues or do not have access to a computer, we have one set up in front of the Land Use office and one of our staff members would be happy to assist you.

In addition to our permitting software we have contracted with MainStreet GIS and developed a Willington specific GIS website. This website turns Town, State and Federal data into visible layers over parcels. Within this website you are able to view aerial photographs as far back as 1934, measure distances, view wetlands, parcel and open space data to name a few. The data links to Willington's assessor's platform for all parcels in town. We recommend using this website with Google Chrome. Lifeguards will monitor activities in swimming areas to prevent accidents, provide assistance to swimmers, caution swimmers of usage areas, rescues swimmers in danger of drowning and administer First Aid/CPR when needed, maintain order in swimming areas at all times, inspect facilities for any dangers and reports them to the appropriate personnel. Lifeguards principle duties are to ensure the safety and well-being of the patrons and to observe and enforce all rules and regulations of the pond. Dates of employment are June 21 - August 18, 2019.

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Tax Collector

We are looking forward to the summer!!!!! We enjoy seeing you all in July!

As a reminder, tax bills will be mailed out in June. These bills will be due July 1st, and may be paid without penalty until August 1, 2019. If you do not receive a bill, please contact our office at 860-487-3111 or email me at collector@willingtonct.org.

Please note, that per §12-130 "Failure to send out or receive any such bill or statement shall not invalidate the tax." Or in simpler terms, failure to receive a tax bill does not relieve the tax payer of his/her responsibility for the payment of taxes or delinquent charges. So please make sure to reach out to our office if you do not receive an expected bill.

What am I being taxed on?

You are being taxed on Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicles as of October 1, 2018.

Real Estate – All real property listed on the Grand List.

Personal Property – In the most general terms, personal property is everything subject to ownership, excluding land, any interest in land or any permanent improvement thereon. It is property that is not permanently affixed to or part of real estate. By its very nature then, personal property is moveable. This broad definition includes tangible items such as airplanes, campers, unregistered vehicles, items for business as furniture, fixtures, equipment, and animals.

Registered Motor Vehicles – Vehicles listed with the Department of Motor Vehicles are coded by tax town, and the Assessor is provided a list of registered vehicles annually. Willington's Town Code is 160.

All tax bills are mailed directly to property owners unless the Tax Collector receives specific instructions to send the bill to your bank or financial institution.

Real Estate and Personal Property tax totaling \$100 or more are due in two installments; July and January. Motor vehicle tax is due in one installment in July. Please note, we do not send out bills for the second installment in January. There is a stub on the July bills for the January payment.

How can I pay my bill?

The Revenue Office accepts cash, money orders or

personal checks for payment at the office. If our office is closed, you can leave a check in our Drop Box outside the front door of the building. You may also pay on-line at www.willingtonct.org and click on the button that says "OnLine Tax Payments". There is a convenience fee of 2.95% for credit cards or \$1.95 for EFT. You can also call 844-859-7566 to pay by phone, but an additional fee of 75 cents will be added. We do have a public access

computer at the Town Hall which will allow you to make a credit card payment on line.

How does my New Assessment change my Tax Bill for July?

We put a Tax Calculator Page on the Revenue Departments Webpage under "How Does My New Assessment Change My Taxes?" located on the left side menu. It will calculate the variance in Taxes by Assessment value changes and once the new Mil Rate is set by the Board of Finance, we will update this page to reflect the upcoming Tax Calculations (not including any exemptions).

Fishing & Hunting

Springtime is in the air and that means fishing. Opening day for Trout Fishing is April 13, 2019, second Saturday in April. Licenses are available in the Town Clerk's Office or on line at <u>www.ct.gov/deep</u>. The Guide Books are available on line at <u>www.ct.gov/deep/fishing</u> or <u>www.ct.gov/ deep/hunting</u> or are in the Town Clerk's Office. The Trout and Salmon Stamp is now required for fishing in any waters where they stock trout and salmon. The cost is \$5.00. You can contact DEEP by phone (860) 424-3105 with any additional questions. Any Connecticut Residents 65 years of age or older are entitled to a free license. Anyone with a "Lifetime" has to renew each year if you are a hunter or if you salt water fish. Make sure you bring in your old license with the conservation number on it.

Dog Licenses

June is the time to register your dog. You will receive renewal reminders at the end of May 2019. There is a fee of \$8.00 for a spayed/neutered dog and a \$19.00 fee for male/female dog. You can license your dog in person or by mail. All dog license requests must be received in this office in person or in the office via the mail by June 30th. An updated rabies certificate, if not current is required, a check payable to the Willington Town Clerk and a <u>self ad-</u> dressed, stamped envelope should be included, if by mail.

New dogs being registered would need the rabies certificate, spayed/neutered papers, check payable to Willington Town Clerk and a self-addressed, stamped envelope, if mailed, for us to process your license. Please register your dog in June to avoid additional late fees as of July 1st. There is a \$1.00 per month and \$1.00 each additional month per state statute.

Fenton-Ruby Park and Wildlife Preserve:

Willington's Public Works Department recently finished constructing a parking lot for hiking trail access on Mason Road. This lot will allow safe parking for access to the Talmadge Spur Trail and the Knowlton Spur Trail. Both trails connect to the Nipmuck Trail, part of the Connecticut Blue Trail System.

Chenes Roches Preserve:

Chenes Roches (transl. oaks rocks) is a 56-acre wooded preserve in northeast Willington and owned by Joshua's Tract Conservation and Historic Trust. Trails wind through a varied terrain of hardwood forests, stands of pines and along a hemlock-shaded stream in a steep-sided valley. A round trip of 1.8 miles will take you across several small spring-fed streams and an altitude change of about 250 feet from the parking lot to the valley stream. A trail map and additional information about the preserve, including directions, can be found on the Joshua's Trust website. joshuastrust.org. There is a kiosk with trail maps at the small parking area 500 feet past the south end of Laurel Drive. Please stay on the trail and respect boundaries where the trail passes near private property.

Note: The parking area is not plowed in the winter and parking on the road is not advisable.)

River Road Athletic Complex - 511 River Road:

Baseball field, basketball court, pavilion, playscape, swings, multi-sport field, volleyball sand court, walking path (one lap = .33 miles) and outdoor fitness equipment. No golfing allowed. Dogs are welcome but must be leashed and cleaned up after. Doggie poo bags are available. Complex is CARRY IN-CARRY OUT. Dogs are not allowed on the baseball field. **State Statute 22-364 states that dogs must be under the direct control of their owners at all times when using town parks. It is the dog owner's responsibility to clean up all dog waste.

The Science Corner with Emily



The hummingbird has always been my favorite New England bird. To me, their arrival signifies the cold months are behind us and spring has arrived. There are over 300 species of hummingbirds across the globe but only one in our region, the ruby-throated hummingbird, whom in my opinion is a true pioneer. These little birds are small but mighty. Weighing in around five grams, equivalent to a seedless grape and standing a few centimeters above a golf tee. These birds flap their wings 53 times per second and reach speeds of 30 miles per hour! The ruby-throated hummingbird is famous for their migration path. These birds breed in eastern

North America but migrate to Central America during the colder months. In order to reach their winter vacation destinations they must cross the Gulf of Mexico, a 600 mile journey they embark on solo. Equating to about 20 hours of continuous flight. Although there has not been a lot of research on how they make the 600 mile journey, there are theories they land on ships traveling across the Gulf to rest their wings and relax before continuing onward. The ruby-throated hummingbird arrives back in New England around early to mid-April. Males begin courting a mate through elaborate dancing while females begin building their half dollar sized velvety nests. Females lay between 1-3 half inch sized eggs up to twice a year. After mating season, males and females separate. Males generally leave the area in early August and females stay with their young until September, then migrate south separately.

In order to attract hummingbirds to your yard, plant red or orange tubular flowers and set up feeders. Nectar can easily be made at home by combining a quarter cup of sugar-per cup of water. Food coloring is not necessary and water should be changed regularly, especially in warm weather, sugar water can ferment and produce toxic alcohol. While watching these exciting birds at home, pay close attention to their feet. Although they are barely visible, the ruby-throated hummingbird can actually contort their bodies and bend their feet in such a way to scratch their head and neck. It's quite the site to see!

Willington Farm Tour and CT Trails Weekend

On June 2, from 2-6PM, local Willington farms and the Willington Conservation Commission will host their 3rd annual "Willington Farm Tour" event, encouraging residents to visit local farms and incorporate Willington-grown products into their households. This year's event will also coincide with CT Trails Weekend, an opportunity for residents to enjoy their local parks and trails. The Willington and Ashford Conservation Commissions have teamed up to offer a hike, which will begin at 10AM at the Fenton-Ruby Park on Burma Road in Willington and pass through the abutting Langhammer property in Ashford. Our goal is to make it easy for families to enjoy an entire day outdoors, close by, and hopefully learn a thing or two about our town's abundant natural resources.

One of several town-owned Willington properties open to the public, the Fenton-Ruby Park and Wildlife Preserve is a great place to recreate year-round. The town encourages hiking, picnicking, fishing, boating, bird watching, cross country skiing, and snow shoeing. The park is located at the intersection of Moose Meadow and Burma Roads, about 1.8 miles north of Route 74. To get to the park from the Town Green, go north on Jared Sparks Road for 2.5 miles. Then turn right onto Moose Meadow Road and, after .4 miles, turn left onto Burma Road, the park entrance.

The June 2nd hike at Fenton-Ruby Park will be led by Rick Peck and is scheduled from 10AM-1PM. After the hike, you should have time to grab some lunch, or better yet, bring a picnic to eat by Taylor Pond. The farms will be ready for your arrival at 2PM.

The 2019 Willington Farm Tour is hosted by 5 working family farms, offering their goods through farm stands, CSAs, farmers' markets, pre-orders, online sales, and in-field pick-ups. There are so many options these days to bring the farm to you, or bring your family straight to the farm! The Willington Farm Tour is a great chance to figure out which option works best for you and your family. Whether your priority is a healthful diet, sourcing ecologically-responsible products, incredible flavor, culinary creativity, or supporting your hard-working friends and neighbors, Willington's got you covered.

Willington farms produce a variety of vegetables, herbs, meats, eggs, hay, straw, mushrooms, syrups, jams, jellies, etc. -- similar products to what would have been grown by subsistence farmers during early colonialization. Many farmers and residents in town also make maple syrup, collect wild plants, such as nuts, berries, and greens, and hunt wild game. These practices kept native people fed for thousands of years and are a great way to eat a healthy, seasonal diet, while expanding your culinary adventures.

Sourcing local products can be difficult at times, but your farmers are using 21st century technology and methodology to make it more straightforward for the consumer. Community Supported Agriculture (CSA, farm share) is perfect for customers who want to get their products straight from the farm and make a connection

with where their food comes from. This option often lets you choose between several seasonal products each week, while maintaining a commitment to a particular farm/farmer. Weekly pick-ups make eating local a routine, rather than a chore.

Farm stands are a convenient, quick stop for customers who are looking to add some local food to their diet, or to supplement their garden/CSA. In Willington, a farm stand is always closer than a grocery store! Farmers markets give a greater variety of regional products and often provide a fun atmosphere for meeting family and friends. Some farms also offer online ordering and/or delivery. These are great subjects to ask about on June 2!

Your first stop on the farm tour could be Cowlick Farms, located at the junction of Seckar Road and Rt. 74. Ray and Victoria Lee of Cowlick Farms raise chickens on pasture for both meat and egg production. Their self-serve farm stand contains the freshest meat in town, and the most convenient! They have whole chickens, a variety of cuts, chicken sausage, pot pie, soup, broth... and the list keeps growing. Ray and Victoria's freezers also contain:

Fenton River Farm beef! Scott and Heidi Morey run Fenton River Farm with help from several community members and 4-H Willing Workers. Their cows come back with ribbons from many local fairs each year. Scott and Heidi also run Fenton River Veterinary Hospital in Tolland, with a new location opening soon in Stafford. Their farm is located on Moose Meadow Road, about a ¼ mile from Rt. 74. You'll see their bucolic pastures just past their neighbor's farm stand...

Their neighbors being Willow Valley Farm (my farm). Willow Valley Farm is a third-generation family farm, growing a variety of vegetables for farmers markets, our farm stand, and our Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. Julia Cartabiano, her son Spencer, and I practice sustainable growing methods, which include NO GMOs, Pesticides, or Synthetic Fertilizers. Our ½ acre blueberry patch and much of our farm machinery dates back to the 1950s when Julia's parents purchased the farm.

Ghost Fawn Homestead, run by Ken and Cari Donaldson, is located at 142 Tolland Turnpike (Rt. 74). The farm was established in 2015 and provides a variety of vegetables for their CSA program using "beyond organic" growing methods. The farmers and their children also raise a variety of livestock. Ask these farmers what you might expect in a 2019 CSA share, or what it's like to grow up on a farm in Willington!

Last, but not least, is Bluebird Farm. In fact, I think they may have the *most* variety of farm products available! Carmen and Joe Hall's farm is located at 211 Jared Sparks Road, on 40 acres of field and forest land. They make a diverse selection of jams, conserves, syrups, mustards, marmalades, etc. under their name "New England Spreads".

They also raise cows, sheep, turkeys, geese, rabbits, and chickens/ducks for eggs. You may also see some pigs, goats, alpacas... maybe more!

We hope you will give Willington farms a try this season. Even if you've visited us before, you're sure to see something new – farmers are always coming up with harebrained schemes to improve for "next year". This is what makes local agriculture so exciting – the innovation, the determination, the fresh start each spring... and of course the fruits of our labor.

Willington Lettuce Wraps

- 1 lb. ground beef and/or chicken *FRF, CF

- 3 cloves garlic, garlic scapes, or ramps *GFH, WVF, or wild harvested

- 1 bunch kale, spinach, mustard greens, etc. *GFH, WVF
- 1 bunch radishes *GFH, WVF
- 3 scallions *GFH, WVF
- 1 butterhead lettuce *GFH, WVF
- 2 tbsp soy sauce
- 2 tbsp rice wine vinegar
- Hot sauce, chili paste, or spread to taste *BF
- 1 tsp sesame oil
- 1/4 cup finely chopped peanuts
- black pepper to taste
- 2 eggs *BF, CF, GFH

Optional garnish: cilantro or basil *GFH, WVF

Cook the ground meat, garlic, and kale (or other green) stems on medium in a skillet, breaking the meat into small pieces as it cooks. Add soy sauce, hot sauce/chili paste/ spread, peanuts, and black pepper part way through cooking. Once the meat is cooked thoroughly, add the leafy part of the kale/green (chopped) and rice wine vinegar, and stir until the greens are wilted, about another minute. Then stir in the sesame oil and turn off the heat. If you can multi-task, scramble two eggs in a separate pan at the same time. Add the eggs to the stir-fry once they're both finished cooking. Separate your head lettuce into single, large leaves. Wash each leaf, especially down near the stem. Slice radishes into thin rounds, and chop scallions. Scoop small servings of the stir-fry onto individual lettuce leaves, top with sliced radishes and scallions, and wrap it up -- a little messy to eat, but well worth it!!

Verbal critiquing should consist of major issues such as point of view, plot and character development, or the story arc of the short story, poem, memoir, or novel.

Grammar, punctuation, and other items not dependent to the story should be written as part of the critique but not verbalized during the discussion. Each submission will be allotted an even amount of time for critiquing based upon the number of submissions and available time.
